

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MEMBERSHIP FEES

There was a huge amount to discuss, this being the inaugural meeting of the new committee, therefore some items have been carried over to the next meeting. 

MAXIMALISM

The definition of this set subject, taken from our website, is:

"Maximalism art is characterised by the use of bold, vibrant colours, and or intricate patterns, and or an abundance of detail.

It contrasts with minimalism by embracing complexity, layering (the assembly of physical artefacts or colour but not multiple exposures or a Photoshop activity) and excess. It can best be summarised as 'more is more', contrasting with the minimalist motto 'less is more'.

It aims to aesthetically deliver a feeling of sensory overload."

Please note this will be the last set subject for this calendar year; the next one is **CALM** for our February competition, due to be submitted on **23rd January 2025**, after our summer break. So keep calm and plan your images for this next set subject to be ready by the due date.

In 2023 he was named the Overall Winner of the Australian Geographic Nature Photographer of the Year with his image 'My Country Burns' taken during the horrific 2019/2020 Black Summer bushfires.

Lightseekers SIG

Early in August Lightseekers visited the Geelong 's Eastern Cemetery. The morning was cold and misty; just the right weather to create atmosphere. Some members captured old graves in poor repair; some lovely old headstones; and others looked for history. Below is a photo taken by David Bridge, of the grave of James Harrison, previously a noted Geelong Resident. His grave has been restored in honour of his work in Geelong. He was Mayor of Geelong, worked in Victorian Government, revived and then owned the Geelong Advertiser, and invented refrigeration. Lyn Northam captured the atmosphere of old graves on a misty day.

A trip to Melbourne for street photography at night, was also popular despite the weather forecast. However, the weather held off until we were safely home. The trains were running reliably and it was exciting to be in such a busy city at night. People rushing for their transport home, some meeting for a meal, as the sun set and the city lights created interesting colour and shapes. We did not attempt to use tripods so there was the usual problem of hand held images in low light. My planned photo of the group suffered from this and could almost qualify as ICM, so instead the photo below shows that magic time of night when the last light catches a city tower, while at street level it is all lights and bustle.



Scotland - 2 gals in a car



We traveled through the spectacular, rugged Scottish landscape, visited old cemeteries and churches and castles. We even managed a visit to a distillery and bought a 'souvenir' to sample in the evenings.


We drove through quaint villages and along beautiful lochs. We rode a Zodiac to Handa Island, one of the largest bird breeding colonies in the N Hemisphere and hiked for 4 hours. Alas, there wasn't a bird to be seen!



We stayed in some memorable B&Bs (one of which was a replica of "Fawlty Towers'- (staff included!) and ate at excellent little restaurants.







The driving was easy, with detours along narrow, country roads that revealed unexpected delights and gave us the freedom to set our own itinerary. Scotland is a small country and you don't have to spend too much time getting from one place to another. I'd go back in a heartbeat if there weren't so many other places on this planet to see.



Deux Femmes à Paris

In September, 2023, my daughter Melanie and I spent a week in Paris after our travels around Scotland.

1 had visited Paris some years ago but Melanie has had many trips there. So my request to her was to 'show me her Paris', the Paris that she knew from many visits and lots of exploring and away from the usual tourist-crowded locations.

She did exactly that.

From our apartment at the Citadines Bastille Marais near the Bastille Monument we set off to walk Paris. And walk we did! It's hard to estimate just how many km we traveled on foot, supplemented by the Metro.

We visited museums and churches. We walked the Paris streets just soaking up the atmosphere.

We took the Metro to out of the way locations to explore mansions, museums and more churches, stopping regularly for sustenance at a myriad of small cafes and bistros.

Sometimes dinner was eaten out and sometimes, at the end of an exhausting day, we bought delicacies from the local supermarket and dined in. Needless to say Parisian eating is an experience of its

The streets and parks and pavement cafes were always filled with people going about their daily business or just relaxing with friends and enjoying their city.

The weather was kind, warm with sun filtered through the sparse cloud cover, and only one very wet day.

Every day was an adventure into what Paris and France has to offer, limited only by the number of hours in the day.

The places we visited:

- ~ Le Musee des Arts Forains, a private museum of 19th century carnival and circus items.
- ~ Le Marche aux Puces de Saint-Ouen (Flea Markets) the largest antiques and second-hand market in the world.
- ~ Chateau de Malmaison, home of Napoleon and his first wife. It is a shrine to sheer, almost obscene opulence.
- ~ Galerie de Paleontologie at d'Anatomie Comparee, housing skeletons from a myriad of species.
- ~ Basilica de St Denis, completed in 1144 holds the tombs of French royalty from the 10th century to Louis XVIII in the 19th century. It is arguably the most awe-inspiring church I have ever visited.
- ~ Saint-Chapelle, enshrined within the city's original Palais de Justice it is Paris' most exquisite Gothic monument and a masterpiece of stained glass.

...... and that's not including walking along the Seine, seeing Notre Dame being resurrected, meandering through the streets of Paris coming across quaint shops and cafes in unexpected places, spending an afternoon out of town walking through the streets of Rueil-Malmaison and finding an outdoor cafe in a park, or sitting outdoors at a bistro having an evening cocktail and watching the people walk by, or walking past a cathedral in Paris and discovering a recital of medieval music played on original instruments.......

You can visit Paris to see the usual famous landmarks that are well-known and much photographed or you can immerse yourself in the city just wandering around, discovering the unexpected and soaking in the ambience that is uniquely 'Paris'.
