TECH CORNER

A club member recently enquired as to why Adobe Lightroom and Photoshop has slowed down on their PC. I'm sure we all have experienced this issue at one time or another and it doesn't necessarily mean buying a new PC.

Additional and improved functionality with each release in these Adobe products increases the system requirements as the software becomes more bloated. If you use Lightroom and interact simultaneously with say, Topaz or DXO simultaneously, this will require additional PC power in respect of processor speed, memory and importantly, graphics card requirements. These software solutions are graphics intense and so a top end graphics card with large VRAM is becoming essential.

Here are several suggestions that may help improve your PC performance and worth trying and determine if any one step or a combination of steps makes a difference.

Step 1 is to make sure that your operating system and Adobe software is up to date with the latest available version.

Step 2 is to review the minimum and recommended system requirements for Lightroom and Photoshop. These will be found on the Adobe website "Lightroom System Requirements". Note that it's always preferable to exceed these requirements and somewhat future proof your system. Upgrade any shortcomings.

Step 3 is to upgrade your HDD's because they are too slow. Having really fast drives make a big difference, Oh! It's helpful to use a SSD storage card or two for your image storage as this will be much faster than using an inbuilt fast HDD.

Step 4 is to run optimising software (I use WinOptimiser) that cleans & optimises your system and removes superfluous and unnecessary files along with optimising system settings and identifying unnecessary running services. This assists in getting a cleaner system. You may also need to run disk fragmentation to improve your HDD performance.

Step 5 is to close all unnecessary software such as internet browsers – they can use a lot of memory when several tabs are open – as well as Microsoft products such as Outlook and Word to also free memory. Inspect your background services using Task Manager and stop any that shouldn't be operational.

Step 6 is to free up some storage space asap as Lightroom requires lots of free space on your hard drive. If you don't have at least 20% of your overall storage space free, that's affecting your Lightroom's performance.

Step 7 is to ensure your catalog(s) are on an internal HDD even though you may store your images on an external hard drive.

Step 8 is to optimise your catalog(s). Go to Lightroom's File menu and choose Optimize Catalog in the drop down list.

Step 9 is to turn off the 'Preset Preview' feature if you have lots of preset's. Lightroom is constantly increasing the quantity of preset's it provides. Go to Lightroom's Preference, and then click on the Performance Tab, then turn off the checkbox for "Enable Hover Preview of presets in Loupe."

A final note. A PC specifically designed for photography is an entirely different beast that is required just for office type applications which are not optimised for imaging work.


